

Earth Day- Every Day

Earth Day began with Senator Gaylord Nelson. He was so concerned about environmental ruin that he persuaded President Kennedy to go on a conservation tour in 1963. The five-day, eleven-state tour wasn't a success, mainly because most politicians didn't think it was an important issue.

However, as ecological degradation became more and more apparent, Senator Nelson continued to raise environmental issues. He announced that in the Spring of 1970 there would be a nationwide grassroots demonstration. The American people would jointly be able to express their concern about what was happening to our natural resources of land, water, and air.

The first Earth Day was a spectacular success! People from all over the country made promises to help the environment. The idea gradually spread to the rest of the world. Today, people from all over our earth realize that there are problems we need to work on. There are solutions if we work together.

Earth Day supporters teach sustainable environments that nurture God's creation. Sustainable environments allow Earth's resources to renew themselves while nurturing life, health, and progress. Sustainable development meets the needs of our present generation, while ensuring future generations have the resources necessary to meet their needs.

A sustainable society lives in harmony with nature. It insists on an economy that doesn't exhaust Earth's resources. It respects cultural experiences of diverse societies. It pursues both economic prosperity and social justice.

Earth Day reminds us that we're all connected through our Creator. Remembering this aids us in making the wisest decisions about our environment. It helps us to preserve what our Creator has given us as stewards. As such, Earth Day should be celebrated every day as we reduce, reuse, recycle, refuse, and restore.

Reduce the human environmental footprint, including the quantity of trash we generate and the amount of energy we consume. While brushing teeth, turn off the water. Reuse what we already have. Find new ways to use what we'd otherwise throw out. Donate plastic milk jugs and the like to programs that turn them into something new and useful like benches, playground equipment, and recycling bins.

Promote and support community <u>Recycling</u>. Buy items that use minimal packaging. Encourage laws that support recycling. <u>Refuse</u> products that harm the environment. Avoid one-use plastics such as straws and bags. Promote laws that support clean energy. <u>Restore</u> the natural environment. Plant native trees and flowers. Provide insects and birds with food, shelter, and proper habitat. Pick up litter and never add to it. It's up to all of us to protect and conserve.








REMINDER: April 23 - Scrapbooking at St. Paul's

April-the name from Latin aperire which means to open. Take time this month to open your eyes to the beauty of the world around you.

April 7 is World Health Day-a day celebrated annually which draws attention to a specific health topic of concern in the world. This year the focus is on keeping humans and the planet healthy and to focus on well-being. This is focusing on ways to improve air and water quality and decrease pollution to help heal our planet. Checkout the World Health Organization for more details and ideas on how you can help.

Alcohol awareness is in the month of April. Alcohol related problems are among the most significant public health issue. Alcohol use disorder affects 15 million people in the US and and estimated 88,000 people die from alcohol related causes which makes it the 3rd leading preventable cause of death in the US. Symptoms of an alcohol related problem include deterioration in your personal or professional life, increase in the amount or frequency of drinking, using alcohol to cope with stress or anxiety, or irritability or anxiousness if you don't have a drink. If you notice any of these signs in yourself or family, please seek help.

April is also testicular cancer awareness month. It is very important to report any changes to your healthcare provider. Testicular cancer is rare and is easily treated. Encourage yourself and the men in your life to check for this. April 23 is Prescription Drug Take Back Day. This is a day to clean out your medicine cabinet and remove all expired and unused medications. These can be taken to any pharmacy to be returned. Please do not flush any medications to prevent any possible entry into the water system.

Parkinson's awareness- usually begins with a tremor in the hand, slow movement, stiffness and loss of balance. Parkinson's is a progressive disease that destroys memory and mental function. There are more than 3 million cases per year. It cannot be cured but can be managed with medication and therapies. If you notice any of these symptoms, seek evaluation so early treatment can be started.
