Fools for Christ

Some say that the tradition of tricking others on April Fools' Day dates back to 16th century France. The start of the New Year used to be observed on April 1st. But in 1562, Pope Gregory introduced a new calendar for the Christian world with the New Year beginning on January 1st.

Some people didn't hear of the new date. Others didn't believe in it. They continued to celebrate the New Year with parties and dancing on April 1st. This led to people playing tricks on the unbelievers and uninformed. They called them "April fools". Today, this tradition carries on where the cleverest April Fools' joke is the one where everyone laughs at the end.

April Fools' Day may also be related to the ancient Roman Spring festival Hilaria, which celebrated the resurrection of the god Attis. The Christian celebration of Easter usually occurs within two weeks of April Fools' Day (but can be as late as April 25). Each Easter, Christians celebrate the resurrection of God in Jesus Christ.

On the first Easter morning, everyone was fooled. Everyone expected Jesus to be in the tomb. The disciples were still hiding. They feared being the next one to be killed. Only women dared to venture forth- and their intention was to anoint Jesus' dead body.

But they became the first humans to receive the Good News of our Resurrected Savior. Depending on the synoptic Gospel, either one or two angels declared to the women, "Jesus is Risen!" Everyone who heard this was amazed and surprised!

Jesus' resurrection is the core of our Christian faith. Celebrating it is the high point of the Christian year. Everything else either leads up to or follows from this history-changing event.

We Christians serve a Risen Savior. As Christ's followers, we're to live into the truth of those words. We should wake up every day shouting, "Jesus is risen!"

Jesus meets us in our daily lives. He asks us not to rely on the law but on the truth he reveals. He calls us to depend not on ourselves but on God's grace. He asks us to be surprised continually by him.

Because Christ lives, we can live also. We don't need to dwell in the confines we feel we must put on our faith or on the faith of others. We can live into the fullness of Jesus' love for us. Through him, we have the sacred and imperishable proclamation of eternal salvation.



Donations to the church can be set up as recurring transactions.


Checks are mailed from the bank to the church and clearly indicate the donor.




Attica Food Link Distribution:






Scrapbooking Fund Raiser at St. Paul's- April 22



April Parish Nurse Notes

April- start of spring and nice weather (hopefully). Make a plan to get out and shake off the winter blues. The health benefits of regular movement go way beyond physical well-being, such as reducing risk for many chronic disease and helping to manage chronic pain. Regular movement helps to reduce feelings of depression and stress, enhances mood, increases energy levels and offers you a way to relax. Move your body in ways that feel good for you-walking, hiking, yoga, cycling, swimming, or just moving around doing daily chores. Try taking frequent stretches throughout the daily. Walk a few laps around the inside of the house and down the sidewalk when weather permits. Eat fresh fruit daily. Aim for daytime sunlight exposure daily- just a few minutes will help rejuvenate you. Don't forget your mental state. Name 3 good things that happen to you every day.

April is Parkinson's awareness month. This is a disease that affects 10 million people worldwide. Symptoms develop slowly over years. Different signs to watch for- tremors at rest (described as pill rolling of hands), slowness of movement, limb stiffness and gait/balance problems. There is no cure, but medications and treatments can slow progression of the disease. Contact your provider and get a referral to a neurologist for diagnosis and early treatment.

Alcohol awareness is also in April. More than 140,000 people die from excessive alcohol use each year in the US. Check your (and loved ones) use with a simple questionnaire. AUDIT- identifies how much and how often you drink to discover any potential problems. Please contact your provider for help.

"Even if you're on the right track, you'll get run over if you just sit there "- Will Rogers. Start this month to slowly increase movement to improve your health. Wash your hands, eat well, get good sleep, stay social and thrive.
