We expect the church to remain like we remember it from our teens.

Mature Christians endeavor to work out of the 85% of the human brain that comprises the cerebral hemisphere. Instead of being reactive, we become responsive, intentional, and thoughtful. We are self-managing, resourceful, open, and aware. We embrace a breadth of understanding and allow time for things to process. We define ourselves from within and learn when challenged. We collaborate, create options, and stay in touch even when tension grows. We are clear, objective, and purposeful.

In the book of Genesis, God shapes creation. Chaos becomes a carefully planned system that continues to adapt and evolve. In Christian tradition, our Triune God is three separate persons- and yet one. Our Creator chooses to be a gracious God who covenants with the created world. Jesus observes the traditions of his Hebraic origin but also breaks rigid human borders as he speaks to women in public, heals on the Sabbath, and dines with sinners. The Holy Spirit both creates and empowers us to be the Body of Christ in the world today. They work individually and cooperatively to usher in and further God's Reign.

In this new creation, we are free to journey with and serve as the Body of Christ in the world today. God's grace and mercy continually gift us. Trust is our ongoing response to God's faithfulness. Righteousness is a new and right relationship with God. Christian love becomes about embracing all of God's children. There is diversity in unity. There is individualism in cooperation.

As God's children, we're not to give our attention to human inconsistencies and sin. We are to be creative and focus on God, nurture healthy relationships, and become more mature in our journey as heirs to God's Reign. We are to make this world a more Godly place in which to live.





April Parish Notes

April- possible meaning to the Roman word Aprillis is the Latin verb aperire which means "to open", because in April the buds of leaves and flowers open.

Alcohol Awareness Month is in April. Most people who struggle with alcohol abuse often underestimate the amount they drink, the duration of the problem, the impact it has on their life and overestimate their ability to control or the impact it has on their life, and overestimate their ability to control or quit. Denial is very common among friends and family who are uncomfortable acknowledging the gravity and reality of the situation. There are an estimated 14.4 million Americans who have a drinking problem, and 31% of overall driving fatalities are alcohol related. If you or your family or friends have a drinking concern, please seek help: there are many available resources.

Parkinson's awareness occurs in April. Parkinson's is a disorder of the nervous system that affects movements, often including tremors. Symptoms may be tremors, slowness of movement, limb stiffness, and/or gait and balance problems. There are more than 200,000 US cases yearly; it is the 14th leading cause of of death. There is no definitive cause, but scientists believe a combination of genetic and environmental are the cause. There are treatment options including lifestyle adjustments and surgery. The course progression is usually slow and eventually a person's daily routine activities may be affected and become challenging. There are support groups which help family deal with the challenges.

Stress awareness month draws attention to the negative impact of stress. Managing stress is an essential component of a healthy lifestyle. Knowing how to manage stress can improve mental and physical well-being as well as minimize exacerbation of health-related issues. Long term stress may continue to or worsen range of health problems; digestive disorders, headaches, sleep disorders; can worsen asthma and has been linked to depression, anxiety, and other mental illness. Many ways to help destress are available: yoga, relaxation techniques, exercise or meditation/ pray. If you or someone you know is struggling, call your local mental health department or call/text 988- available 24/7.

Have some discontinued or expired prescriptions? April27th- is Prescription Drug Take Back Day. Your local pharmacies will take your unused medications. Clean out that medicine cabinet!
