



Maturing Well

(The following is adapted from essays on aging by Fr. Richard Rohr.)

Old age seems to be part of a plan that God has prepared as part of the school of life. It's an almost complete changing of gears from the first half of our lives. But aging gracefully doesn't happen without lots of inner resistance, denials, and eventual surrenders.

In our youth obsessed culture, it is difficult for us to accept the grace that aging brings. That's why God's Holy Spirit continually works with us and through us to deepen our sense of whose we are and what we really desire. The word "ripening" can help us move beyond our concerns with aging.

Ripening, at its best, is a slow, patient learning, and sometimes even a happy letting go. It's an emptying out to create readiness for a new kind of fullness. If we don't allow it to occur, an ever-increasing resistance and denial sets in which becomes an obstacle to further growth.

No one can keep us from the second half of our own lives except ourselves. Nothing can inhibit us except our own lack of courage, patience, and imagination. Some falling apart of our first half of life is necessary for this to happen. So, don't waste time lamenting poor parenting, lost jobs, physical challenges, failed relationships, or tragedies. If we live long enough, we all go to our graves with unresolved life agendas and personal concerns. This doesn't mean our life has been wasted.

In all we've been through, God's Love has been using us for its own purposes. It's been transforming us and maturing us to more closely align us with God's vision of us. It calls us to age well with spiritual depth and purpose. We're to embrace an increasing tolerance for ambiguity and a growing sense of subtlety. We're to adopt an ever-larger ability to include rather than exclude. We're to desire everything good, true, and beautiful. We're to desire God.

We're to learn how to truly hope. The hope of older years often tends to be less concrete and more like real hope. Our experiences are richer and more meaningful because we're less focused on a concrete goal and more focused on enjoying the event.

We learn to be present to God's mysterious, sustaining presence. Our hearts and minds ripen into holiness, spiritual fulfillment, and a capacity to live in trustful faith. This energizes and guides our efforts, bringing us to realms of grace that are way beyond anything we can achieve by our efforts alone.

Ripening into the spiritual maturity is ours to cultivate. We can ask ourselves what kind of person we've been becoming all these years. Do we like that person? Are we becoming more honest, more decent, more caring, and more merciful? Are we bearing witness to peace, love, joy, wisdom, and fearlessness. If not, what must we be doing about it now?



Attica Food Link Distribution:








Candlelight Service 7pm November 20

November brings COPD awareness month. COPD - chronic obstructive pulmonary disease- is a chronic, progressive breathing disorder. Many times is caused by long term tobacco use or second hand smoke. It can also be caused from emissions from factories and vehicles. Air becomes trapped inside the lungs due to excess mucous and narrowing of the air passages. COPD affects 16.4 million diagnosed people. The first step to prevent problems is to not smoke or be around people who smoke. This also includes vaping. If you or a loved one smokes, encourage the to cut down and stop. There are many treatments that can help with this- contact your health care provider for help.

November 17th is the Great American Smokeout day- a day selected to stop smoking for 24 hours, and to make resolutions quit.

Along with COPD awareness, November is also Lung Cancer Awareness month. Lung cancer is the 2nd most common cancer and the leading cause of cancer deaths worldwide. Each year about 218,500 people in the USA are affected by lung cancer; about 142,000 die from this disease. Be alert to the following symptoms: new cough that doesn't go away, change in a chronic cough, coughing up blood, shortness of breath, chest pain, wheezing, loss of weight without trying, headache and bone pain. Avoid second hand smoke, avoid carcinogens, eat healthy, exercise. And see your health care provider if you have any symptoms or concerns.

Alzheimer's disease is a slow, progressive, neurodegenerative <u>disease.it</u> is the cause of 60-70% of cases of dementia. Early symptom is difficulty remembering recent events. This is followed by problems with language, disorientation, mood swings, loss of motivation and behavioral issues. There is no cure for this disease, but there are treatments that can slow progression. It's important to have a good neurological evaluation to track this disease.

Remember to take time to enjoy the beautiful fall weather we have here. Take a walk- dress warm! Eat healthy and get plenty of rest. Continue to wash your hands frequently. This is a good time to get your flu vaccine if you haven't already done so. Check on the status of your pneumonia accident also. Stay safe!
