





October is a beautiful time in Western New York. Summer has ended and we begin preparations for fall and winter. Take this time to schedule vaccinations and update immunizations since flu and Covid seasons will be in full swing. Wash your hands frequently, get adequate sleep, eat a healthy balanced diet and attempt to walk or exercise daily.

Since the weather will be changing and daylight hours lessening, be aware of your mental status. October is Antidepressant awareness month. Keep in tune with your (or your family's) moods. If you notice a change in eating or sleeping habits, or decrease in interests, please talk to someone and get help. Seasonal affect disorder is common in the fall due to the change of seasons. There is plenty of resources and help available.

Breast cancer awareness is also in October. Make sure you and your female friends/relatives get mammograms and exams. Breast cancer can be treated when discovered early.

With school starting, please keep an eye on your children. Bullying prevention month addresses the concerns for our children. Talk to your kids about school and address any issues with them to attain a safe school environment.

Halloween is a fun time for all. Be aware of safety concerns with costumes- don't get costumes that can block vision or interfere with walking. Wear bright reflective clothing or decorate costumes with reflective tape. Carry a flashlight. Examine the candy to make sure it has not been tampered with. My dad did this for years as we were growing up- found out later he wanted to get the good treats!

Along with all the candy, we also observe dental hygiene month. Remember to have twice yearly dental checkups. Floss twice a day along with good brushing.
